## CALL TO ACTION

### Australians to celebrate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Apollo 11 Lunar landing



For many, the most significant achievement of the 20<sup>th</sup> century occurred on July 21, 1969 (local time), when humans set foot on another celestial body – our Moon for the first time, and several days later returned safely to Earth.

The world watched via television as the Apollo 11 mission unfolded, and an estimated 20% of the entire population of the Earth were united in the joy of the achievement.

The TV pictures of those steps were received in real time via the Honeysuckle Creek tracking station near Canberra, and they continue to be the most requested news video clip of all time.

Many Australians played major roles in supporting Apollo 11 and other Apollo missions, six of which were also lunar landings. Since 1989, groups of these ex- space trackers from Honeysuckle Creek, Tidbinbilla, and Carnarvon tracking stations, plus the CSIRO's radio telescope at Parkes, as well as other facilities in Australia and around the world, have held reunions every 21<sup>st</sup> July to commemorate the first landing.

We are now approaching the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of that event, and while there are still a few of us left, we think it will be an appropriate opportunity to commemorate this remarkable achievement, and the role Australia played in it.

We have formed a committee with the aim of ensuring that events being planned for Canberra and elsewhere in Australia complement each other, and to encourage local and national organisations to join us in what will probably be the last anniversary that workers who took part in those exciting times will be able to participate.
